

# ecoGP DU ROUSSILLON 2023:

### **Electric rebirth 2023**

This year is a special one for the ecoGP series. We will be celebrating the 10th anniversary of the ecoGP. Over the past ten years, the series has undergone many technological changes, the number of electric vehicles has increased tenfold, and the competitions have taken place on the most famous tracks in Europe.

We have held our competitions every year, and even the restrictions during the COVID period did not force us to completely abandon the organization of the competition. We can say with confidence that we have already reached an excellent level of organization and have many supporters and good partners.

Our participants started by taking part in one race and enthusiastically won the season's cup. They surprised us with their ability to endure, thirst for victory, enthusiasm, emotionality, and skills. Some of them set records for the number of laps in one event or the number of victories. They traveled across Europe in their electric cars to bring home the ecoGP Cup at the end of the season.


Over the past ten years, we have organized almost 30 competitions in different parts of Germany, Spain, France, Czech Republic, Romania. We will hold the 30th event at the end of the 2023 season in Meppen, Germany. It will be not just an ecoGP, but a celebration of electric mobility. We even

expect to set a World Record of most Tesla cars ever driven in a parade. It is no secret that this year, ecoGP will be the first time at Circuit des Platanes in France. It will be the first event to open the season. And it will take place in a picturesque location near the Pyrenees and Mediterranean Sea.



## Roussillon

To get into the spirit and feel inspired, you need to delve a little deeper into history because we are reviving a historic track where the most famous racers once won, although it was not as famous as Le Mans.



1946, Europe is just beginning to emerge from the bloodiest war in history.

France, one of the first countries to be hit by the Wehrmacht, lies in ruins. It is necessary to rebuild everything literally - destroyed homes, bridges, roads, and businesses. Everything, even the most necessary items, is in short supply. Even bread is

sold on ration cards. Sales of gasoline are strictly limited, and spare parts are sold to speculators. Used tires on the black market are treated as antiques. What about racing in such conditions for the French? But in Perpignan, they understand that events associated with peaceful life

can lift spirits. And they decide to hold a grand Prix, laying the track on the

most beautiful streets of the ancient city. The circuit got its name - Circuit des Platanes - in honor of the age-old plane trees, which have become the same landmark of Roussillon as the Fort de Castille and the palace of the kings of Mallorca. But the main attraction of the circuit was the spectators who, year after year, surrounded the Circuit des Platanes in a lively corridor. Over the next

seven years, the city circuit hosted races for both racing and sports cars, as well as motorcycles, invariably drawing tens of thousands of citizens and guests of Perpignan.



ancient Roussillon. It got its name in honor of the century-old plane trees growing along the main arteries of the city. Between 1946 and 1949 the "grand prix" was held here, organized by ACR (automobile club founded in 1920), invariably gathering world stars - Juan-Manuel Fangio, Jean-Pierre Wimille, Eugène Chaboud, Louis Rosier, Prince of Biers, Maurice Trintignant, etc. who raced here in Ferrari, Bugatti and Maserati cars. Then, for security reasons, Roussillon hosted Formula 2 races. Last, in 1952, motorcycle racers competed here. In 2020, the ACR celebrated their 100 years and published the book (with help from Jean Alesi) to highlight these 4 International Grand Prix from 1946 to 1949.

In 2022 they started to organize the event "Roue Libre".



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
